### Export of grains and legumes: statistics on volumes



From 07/01/2023 to 12/31/2023 via ports Australia exported **16 441.7 thousand tons** of grain and leguminous cargo.

Wheat accounted for 53.1% of total exports – **8 729.4 thousand tons** 



The largest volume of grain shipments passed through the port of Kwinana.

From 07/01/23 to 12/31/23, **3 569 thousand tons** of wheat, rapeseed, barley, sorghum and other cargo were sent abroad through the port terminals.




## **Export of grains and legumes:** statistics on exporters



The exporter ranking continues to be topped by **CBH Grain**, Australia's largest grain exporter.

From July 1 to the end of December 2024, the company shipped abroad **3 989.4 thousand tons** of grain and leguminous cargo.



Also included in the TOP 5 are the following companies:

Viterra Australia PTY – 2 621.3 thousand tons Graincorp Australia – 2 342.3 thousand tons AWB Cargill Australia – 1 691.7 thousand tons Australian Grain Export PTY – 1 225.4 thousand tons



During this period, mainly Australia exported wheat.

Australia enters steadily in the TOP 10 world wheat exporters.

### **Export of cereals and legumes:** statistics on importing countries


From 07/01/23 to 12/31/23, China became the main buyer of grains and legumes from Australia (28.9% of the total volume).


**China** mainly imported barley: from 07/01/23 to 12/31/23 the country received **2 372.0 thousand tons** from Australia


Australia also exported grains and leguminous crops to Indonesia, the Philippines, Japan, the United Arab Emirates, Vietnam, South Korea, Mexico, India, Yemen, etc.

The TOP-5 buyers of Australian wheat included:

Indonesia – 1 607.0 thousand tons Philippines – 1 154.1 thousand tons Vietnam – 750.5 thousand tons South Korea – 660.9 thousand tons









Wheat supplies from Australia have great importance for the world market, since the country is one of the largest world exporters of this crop.

Therefore, the November decrease in supplies By foreign markets have caused great concern, as they could lead to an increase in world prices.

In November 2023, wheat exports from Australia compared to October 2023decreased by 17%.

Meanwhile, according to experts, the situation which developed in the Red Sea, can promote growth competitiveness of Australian wheat in the markets of Asia, the Middle East and Eastern Africa.

This is due to the fact that, unlike Ukraine, the EUUSA and other countries transporting grain cargo towards these countries through the Red Sea,

Australia doesn't need this.

On the other hand, the situation in the Red Sea could have a negative impact on Australian canola exports.

The bulk of this crop is shipped to the EU through the Suez Canal.

And investment in canola processing is growing as demand for renewable energy rises and diets change in Southeast Asia.

Over the past 25 years, canola production in Australia has increased from 2.5 million tonnes to 8.5 million tonnes.

The country plans to attract a significant amount of investment in crop processing, because Australia now mainly exports raw materials.

The largest industry players are GrainCorp and Cargill.
